This is a very basic edition with no hyperlinks in the table of contents. There are also no footnotes. There are page numbers. These issues were not a big problem for me since it was such a short book. Since the translation was clear, and the references to historical events were familiar to me, I saw no need for extensive footnotes. Overall, I would give this simple Kindle edition 3 stars. This is quite a short book, 129 pages or 2199 `locations'.This translation was by George Long and was originally published in 1888. It contains a short biographical note about the life of Epictetus. Very little is known, other than he was a slave that was allowed to teach philosophy back in the early 2nd century CE. He was a stoic and these writings reflect that. The discourses take up the majority of the book and consist of short essays on various subjects. The last 20 pages of the book consist of the Encheiridion (or Manual), which are even shorter snippets of advice. This is classic wisdom literature.I feel that his experience as a slave influenced his philosophy in a very interesting and positive way. He talked a lot about what we can control versus what we cannot control. We can control our own happiness or character, but cannot control what others do to us. He puts a lot of emphasis on how we can be in command of our own will and should not let others have power over it. Overall, I liked his philosophy. Here is a slave that was not about to let others destroy his life or happiness.I gave the content 5 stars for an overall rating of 4 stars. I highly recommend reading this to anyone interested in philosophy in general. I have not explored other versions on the Kindle; it would be nice to
