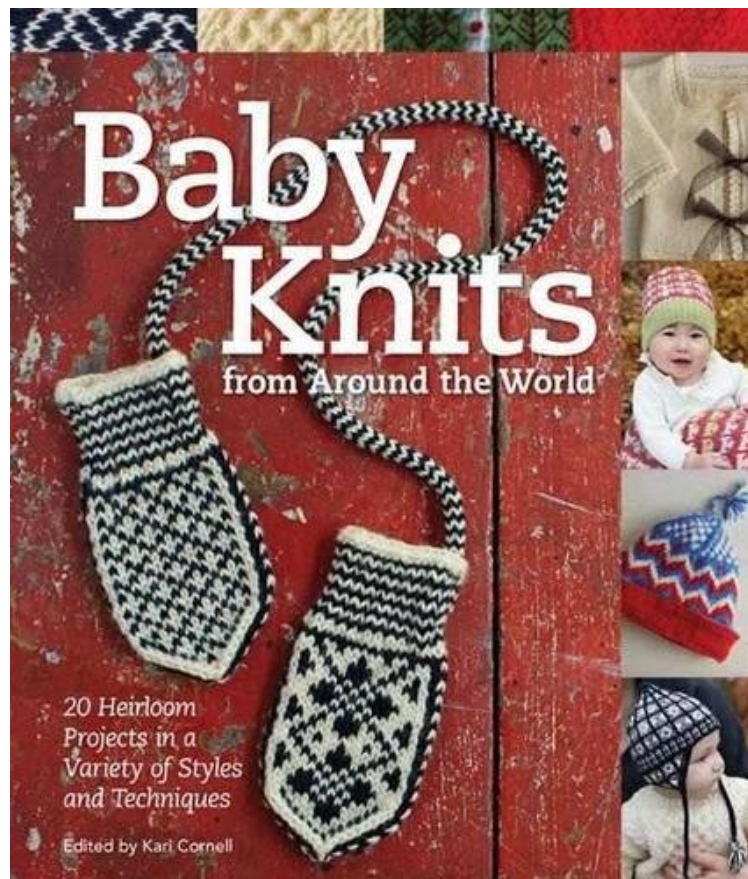

Baby and Toddler Knits from Around the World By Fairbanks Reader - Bonnie Brody This is a book of baby knits from different geographical parts of the globe. It has sections on Knits of Scandinavia, Knits of the United Kingdom and Europe, Knits of the West and Knits of the East. Altogether, there are 20 projects included. In the Scandinavian section I like the Swedish Dubbelmossa hat. It is double layered and guaranteed to keep your little one warm. The hat has a Fair Isle type pattern on it that is knit from a chart. The design has geometric lines and fishes. In The United Kingdom and Europe section, I like the Fair Isle Sweater in a lovely purple with a button shoulder. Most of the sweater is in purple with the Fair Isle pattern on the bottom in lovely yellow, green and contrasting purple. The Aran Sweater is my favorite pattern in the book. It is a traditional aran

design with cables and bobbles. It is knit in the traditional aran white and is a pullover. In the Knits of the West section I love the Andean Lace Baby Chullo hat. It has intricate lacework knit with a very fine gauge on size 3 needles. The color is a soft gray/blue hue. I also like the Andean Kitty or Bird Cap. It is knit with a striped color rib and has a pattern for a kitty or bird motif. It is a very warm hat for a toddler. The Blueberry Forest Sweater is an adorable cardigan for a toddler. It is knit primarily in greens and blues and has a forest motif. Knits of the East has a beautiful Baby Kimono Sweater in red that is adorable. It is knit in a textured pattern that even a beginner can do. The Shibori Blanket is spectacular. It has a repeating pattern of shibori fabric and is semi-symmetrical. The designer suggests that it be knit in washable yarn. The Chinese Knot Headband is an adorable accessory for the little girl in your life. All in all, there are several patterns that I would knit in this book though there are some I would skip over. This book includes detailed instructions for ever-popular baby hats, blankets, sweaters, booties, pants, dresses, toys, and mitts; while introductions to each pattern detail the history of the technique that the design employs. With over 100 gorgeous photos and diagrams throughout, knitters of all proficiency levels are sure to enjoy Kari Cornell's hand-picked collection of baby knitting projects.

Baby knits are the perfect way to try out new techniques or styles: they're small and quick to knit, and they almost always look cute, even if crafters have made a few mistakes along the way. In this collection, freelance writer and editor Cornell (editor, *For the Love of Knitting*; *Modern Knits*) and her fellow designers explore knitting traditions from all over the world, through a variety of garments and accessories sized for babies and toddlers. Many of the projects feature stranded colorwork in folk motifs, including a Finnish-inspired newborn hat and mitt set, a traditional Fair Isle sweater, and a cap with an Andean bird motif. There's also a lovely Spanish crib blanket, a lacy Peruvian chullo, and a traditional Aran sweater. Because knowledge of each method is assumed, no specialized directions are provided.
